AUSTIN, TX - Stars from all over the country travelled to Austin, Texas and performed without compensation for the Harvey Can't Mess With Texas: A Benefit Concert for Hurricane Harvey Re*lief* on September 22 at the Frank Erwin Center.

The largest live concert benefit featured exclusive performances and original collaborations from Leon Bridges, Willie Nelson, Paul Simon,

James Taylor, Bonnie Raitt, Lyle Lovett, Nathaniel Rateliff & The Night Sweats, plus many more guests.

Leon Bridges is a 28year-old accomplished gospel and soul singer on Columbia Records. Bridges came home to Texas to join the hurricane relief effort.

The awesome musical talent was joined by Matthew McConaughey, Renée Zellweger, Luke Wilson, Austin Mayor Steve Adler, Houston Chief of Police Art Acevedo, and more. The commentaries made were genuine and heartfelt, while images of storm devastated areas of Texas played on screens around the room.

To hear from reporters on the ground during Harvey's move through Houston, the Houston Police Chief described how Houston's own officers worked through the hurricane knowing that they too lost their homes. It was also unmistakably heart-wrenching to hear of the bravery of medical professionals who worked untiringly to treat victims of the storm ridden areas.

Interwoven into these stories the crowd heard uplifting, strong and inspiring music, offering hope that Texas will recover. We will rebuild and we will go on. We heard the recurring theme that we are TEXAS STRONG, TEXAS PROUD.


LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — The nine Black teenagers who integrated Little Rock's Central High School in September 1957 all went on to seek higher education. Eight remain alive.

While they're most known for their collective story, they have their individual achievements as well.

Here are their stories, as provided by organizers of the 60th anniversary of the Little Rock Nine's desegregation of all-white Central.

MELBA PATTILLO BEALS

Melba Pattillo Beals currently lives in the San Francisco area. Her mother, Lois, had been among the first Black graduates from the Univer-



State University, a master's at Columbia and a doctorate at the University of San Francisco. She worked as a reporter in public television and at an NBC affiliate and also wrote "Warriors Don't Cry: A Searing Memoir of the Battle to Desegregate Little Rock's Central High School."

ELIZABETH ECKFORD

Because all of Little Rock's high schools were closed a year after the desegregation battle, Elizabeth Eckford moved to St. Louis, where she obtained her GED diploma. She attended Knox College in Illinois and received a bachelor's degree in history at Central State Uni-



versity in Ohio.

Eckford served in the U.S. Army. She and a key tormentor captured in a 1957 photograph outside Central High School received a humanitarian award from the National Conference for Community and Justice after their reconciliation more than three decades after the crisis. Eckford lives in Little Rock.

ERNEST GREEN

Ernest Green was the first of the Little Rock Nine to earn a diploma at Central High School. He worked in public finance for Lehman Brothers in Washington and was listed in Black Enterprise's 2006 list of the "75 Most Powerful Blacks on Wall Street."

Green has a bachelor's degree in social science and a master's in sociology from Michigan State University, plus honorary documents from Central State University, Michigan State and Tougaloo College.

gloria ray Karlmark

Gloria Ray Karlmark is the youngest granddaughter of a former slave. After leaving Little Rock for Missouri while her hometown schools were closed, she graduated from the newly integrated Kansas City Central High School in 1960. After graduating from the Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago, she joined IIT's research institute as an assistant mathematician.

In the 1970s, she and her husband immigrated to Sweden and she joined IBM's Nordic Laboratory. She retired in 1994.

CARLOTTA WALLS LANIER

Carlotta Walls LaNier is the youngest member of the Little Rock Nine, entering Central High School at age 14. She graduated from Central in 1960 and attended Michigan State University for two years and later graduated from the University of Northern Colorado.

She received an honorary doctorate from Northern Colorado and is in the Colorado Woman's Hall of Fame and the National Women's Hall of Fame. She wrote "A Mighty Long Way: My Journey to Justice at Little Rock Central High School" and is a real estate broker.

TERRENCE ROBERTS

Terrence Roberts entered Central High as a junior, completed the school year and moved with family to California, where he graduated from Los Angeles High School in 1959. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology from California State University, Los Angeles, a master's in

social welfare from UCLA
and a doctorate in psychology from Southern Illinois
University.

He was on the faculty at Pacific Union in the 1970s and was assistant dean at the UCLA School of Social Welfare from 1985 to 1993. He has written "Lessons from Little Rock" and "Simple, Not Easy: Reflections on Community, Social Responsibility and Tolerance."

JEFFERSON THOMAS

Jefferson Thomas was running track at all-Black Dunbar Junior High School when he volunteered to help integrate all-white Central High School as a sophomore in 1957. He graduated from Central in 1960 and subsequently earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Los Angeles State College. He was an accounting supervisor at Mobil Oil and joined the Department of Defense when Mobil moved its credit card operations out of Los Angeles. He moved to Columbus, Ohio, in 1989.

The 27-year federal employee retired in 2002 and died in 2010.

MINNIJEAN BROWN TRICKEY

Minnijean Brown Trickey was the first of the Little Rock Nine to be suspended, after retaliating against her tormentors. She moved to New York and lived with a pair of social scientists who had played a role in the Brown v. Board of Education case and graduated from the New Lincoln School in 1959.

She studied journalism at Southern Illinois University and later received a bachelor's of social work in native human services from Laurentian University and a master's of social work at Carleton University, both in Ontario. She worked in President Bill Clinton's administration as deputy assistant secretary for workforce diversity at the Department of the Interior.

THELMA MOTHERSHED WAIR Thelma Mothershed

Wair completed her high school work through correspondence courses and summer school in St. Louis. She received her diploma by mail.

Wair graduated from Southern Illinois University with a degree in home economics education and earned a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Southern Illinois. She worked in East St. Louis, Illinois, schools for 28 years — 10 as a home economics teacher and 18 as a counselor — before retiring in 1994 and moving back to Little Rock.

NEW YORK (AP) — Charles Bradley, known as the "Screaming Eagle of Soul" for a powerful, raspy style that evoked one of his musical heroes, James Brown, died Saturday at age 68.

Bradley, who achieved success later in life with his 2011 debut album "No Time for Dreaming," was diagnosed with stomach cancer in the fall of 2016 and underwent treatment, according to a statement from his publicist Shazila Mohammed. He headed out to tour earlier this year after receiving a clean bill of health, but the cancer returned recently, spreading to his liver, the statement said.

Recording on the Daptone label, Bradley

was a fiery live performer. He followed up his first album with "Victim of Love" in 2013. His third album, "Changes," was released last year.

Among his TV appearances was a stop last year on "CBS This Morning: Saturday," which earned him an Emmy nomination.

Born in Gainesville, Florida, Bradley found himself living in New York at age 8. He left home as a teenager and lived as an itinerant until he settled in Brooklyn 20 years ago.

Bradley idolized Brown, working as a Brown impersonator known as Black Velvet before he was discovered by Gabriel Roth, a Daptone co-founder. He later became known for closing

shows under his own name with hugs for his audiences.

"The world lost a ton of heart today," Roth said in the statement. "Charles was somehow one of the meekest and strongest people I've ever known. His pain was a cry for universal love and humanity. His soulful moans and screams will echo forever on records and in the ears and hearts of those who were fortunate enough to share time with him."

Roth said he told Bradley recently there's solace to be found for fans knowing Bradley "will continue to inspire love and music in this world for generations to come."

According to an affidavit filed with the court, Samson told Nashville police following his arrest that he arrived at the church armed and fired upon the building. Court documents do not indicate whether Samson has an attorney in advance of his

In March, police were dispatched to Samson's home. Samson told police the woman was trying to enter his house despite his attempts to break off contact. He told officers he was afraid of her because she had struck him in the past. No charges were filed bleeding.

Officers in January responded to two domestic disturbances between Emanuel Samson and a woman who accused him of cheating on her. Samson cut his hand when he punched a small TV on her desk, according to statements to police.

"He's amazing," Rosa told reporters about

had attended services a year or two ago, said Don Aaron, a spokesman for the Metro Nashville Police Department.

Melanie Smith, 39, of Smyrna, Tennessee, was killed when the shooter opened fire in the parking lot. Spann's wife, Peggy, 65, was also shot as well as William and Marlene Jenkins, 83 and 84 respectively, Linda Bush, 68, and Katherine Dickerson, 64. Police said none of the surviving victims suffered lifethreatening injuries.

Forty-two people were at the church at the time of the shooting, Aaron said.

Rep. Al Green Meets with the Black Press on Capitol Hill

During an on the record meeting with publishers of Black-owned newspapers on Capitol Hill, Rep. Al Green (D-Texas) discussed a range of issues from symbols of the Confederacy to advertising in the Black Press and the impeachment of President Donald Trump.

Publishers and staffers representing the Daily Challenge, Cross Roads News, the San Diego Voice and Viewpoint, the Chicago Crusader, the Gary Crusader, The Washington Informer, the Michigan Chronicle, Atlanta Daily World, New Pittsburgh Courier, Chicago Defender and the Houston Forward Times attended the meeting, that lasted more than an hour.

When he learned that the Black Press was celebrating its 190th anniversary, Green, who represents Houston, Missouri City and Stafford, recommended that the milestone receive a formal Congressional citation. Benjamin F. Chavis, Jr., the president and CEO of the National Newspaper Publishers Association, said that Congressman Green is a servant of the people, adding that he was one of the best lawmakers on Capitol Hill.

Green said that he has taken up the cause to get Confederate monuments removed from public spaces and he lamented the proliferation of Confederate monuments and symbols across the South and in Houston, in particular. According to ABC 13 Eyewitness News, "Spurred on by calls from the public, Mayor Sylvester Turner has agreed to begin a full review of Confederacy-related statues on Houston public lands."

Article II, Section 4 of the Constitution states that: "The President, Vice President and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors."

Green noted that for the president to be impeached, the president does not have to commit a crime. Green said that lawmakers, who are serious about starting the impeachment process, should not wait for the outcome of former FBI chief Robert Mueller's special investigation into Russia's tampering with the 2016 election. Green encouraged the Black publishers to read the "Federalist Papers," especially "Federalist 65," written by Alexander Hamilton.

The Texan lawmaker said that the Constitution gives each member of the House the same amount of power when it comes to impeachment. When he was asked about the status of the Government Accountability Office's report on advertising spending by federal agencies, Green said that that invidious discrimination still exists. The federal government is the single largest advertiser in the United States, and Black-owned companies have been disproportionately left out of the bidding process for government contracts for years.

Green concluded with a popular political quote that epitomizes Mahatma Gandhi's nonviolent philosophy.





'Obamacare' Survives; GOP Last-Gasp Repeal Try is "Dead as a Doornail"

WASHINGTON (AP) -

"Obamacare" lives on. Senate Republicans, short of votes, abandoned their latest and possibly final attempt to kill the health care law Tuesday, just ahead of a critical endof-the-week deadline.

The repeal-and-replace bill's authors promised to try again at a later date, while President Donald Trump railed against "certain so-called Republicans" who opposed the GOP effort. But for now, Trump and fellow Republicans who vowed for seven years to abolish President Barack Obama's law will leave it standing and turn their attention to overhauling the nation's tax code instead.

The GOP's predicament was summed up bluntly by Sen. Bill Cassidy of Louisiana, a lead author of the legislation: "Through events that are under our control and not under our control, we don't have the votes."

"Am I disappointed? Absolutely," he said after a GOP lunch attended by Vice President Mike Pence.

Standing alongside Cassidy, Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said: "We haven't given up on changing the American health care system. We are not going to be able to do that this week, but it still lies ahead of us."

"We do think it's time to turn to our twin priority, reforming the tax code," McConnell said.

There was much talk of returning to the repeal effort later, but not all Republican senators were putting on that brave face.

Sen John Kennedy of Louisiana described the bill as "dead as a doornail."

The bill Cassidy coauthored with Sen. Lindsey Graham of South Carolina would have unraveled the central elements of Obama's law, including the requirement for Americans to carry health insurance or pay fines, and offered block grants to states to design their own systems with less federal control.

Republicans are also strongly in agreement on a need for action on overhauling the loophole-ridden U.S. tax code, and hope that if they also succeed in getting Americans a tax cut, their failure on health care will be forgiven.

Yet they began the health care effort with unanimity, too, up until the devilish details began to emerge and divide them as they pursued a partisan effort against united Democratic opposition.

Much the same could happen on taxes, where Republicans are at the beginning of the process, with plans to unveil a blueprint on Wednesday.

On health care, the urgency confronting the GOP this week lay in special budget rules that protected the legislation from a Democratic filibuster, allowing the Republicans to pass it with just 50 votes, plus a tie-breaker from Pence, instead of the 60 often required. Those special rules expire Sept. 30.

Even with that advantage McConnell had little room for error given his slim 52-48 vote majority in the 100-member Senate. And as in July, when Arizona Sen. John McCain cast a dramatic late-night thumbs down to kill the previous repeal bill, McConnell was unable to corral the 50 "Ayes."

In addition to McCain, moderate GOP Sen. Susan Collins of Maine announced her opposition, as did conservative Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky. Several other senators were skeptical or undeclared, among them



Lisa Murkowski of Alaska, who waited until McConnell had conceded defeat Tuesday to issue a statement criticizing "a lousy process" on the legislation.

A full analysis of the legislation was never completed by the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office, contributing to critics' complaints of a rushed process, but independent experts warned that millions could lose coverage, states could relax existing requirements, and coverage could end up being unaffordable for many, including people with preexisting conditions.

That last element drew attention from latenight TV host Jimmy Kimmel, who got involved in the health debate in April after his son was born with a heart defect. He was outspoken on his ABC show in denouncing the bill and accusing Cassidy of lying about it. On Tuesday Kimmel tweeted a photo of his smiling baby son and wrote, "Thanks to all who stood up and spoke out from this happy guy and his less-fortunate friends

#GoodbyeGrahamCassidy." The legislation also would have cut \$1 trillion from Medicaid over the next decade, prompting angry protesters in wheelchairs to descend on the one hearing held on the bill, on Monday, chanting "No cuts to Medicaid! Save our liberty!" Dozens were pulled out and arrested as cameras captured the striking scene.

For Trump, the failure added one more justification for his ongoing grudge against McConnell, and provided another reason to turn his back on Republicans and make deals with Democrats instead, as he's begun to do of late. Indeed, he said in a private bipartisan meeting of House Ways and Means members Tuesday that he would work with Democrats on health care if the Republicans "didn't get repeal done," according to Rep. Richard Neal, D-Mass., who was present.

Neal quoted Trump as saying, "You get a better deal if it's bipartisan."


disposing of taxes. But even under the optimistic assumption that Republicans will pass tax legislation in the coming months, Graham's timeline would put the next health care debate into the 2018 congressional campaign season, and that would be unlikely to improve the bill's chances.

It's unclear how the collapse of the GOP's latest repeal effort will affect Americans' 2018 sign-up season for subsidized private health policies under the Affordable Care Act.

Wednesday is the deadline for insurers to finalize 2018 contracts. Uncertainty over whether the Trump administration will continue to pay monthly subsidies for assistance with copays and deductibles has been blamed for driving up next year's premiums.

Although earlier this month senators launched a bipartisan effort to try to stabilize premiums for next year, that was put on hold as Republicans pursued repeal. It's unclear if it can be revived, particularly since feelings are raw on both sides.
